




BRING A HEARTY APPETITE!



#### SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE REQUESTS MICHIGAN MATERIALS

Recently the GRMS received letters from George L. Stanley, assistant professor of science at Sauk Valley College in Dixon, Ill., which is organizing a new geology-geography department. They are approaching a small number of groups such as ours, on a trial basis, because they are desperately in need of (1) specimens for a permanent research and study collection, especially large cabinet type specimens of higrade ores, crystals, crystalline masses and fossils; (2) materials for student laboratory use — all types of rocks, minerals and fossils.

Each specimen that becomes a part of the permanent collection will receive an appropriate label listing the name of the group from which it has been received. They would also be most thankful to receive a complete mineralogical and geological description of the material for identification purposes. To date they have one specimen from Michigan. The college, a fairly new one, has 1180 students this year. It is hoped that the proposed displays will influence some of the students to enroll in the beginning course in geology and mineralogy.

The Board of Control has decided that this would be a worthy project for our group, well in line with the educational aims of our society. The club will pay for the packing and postage to send whatever items our members may choose to donate for this purpose.

PLEASE BRING SPECIMENS FOR THE COLLEGE TO THE DECEMBER MEETING. Surely enough of our members have sufficient collections so that the contribution of a good piece for this purpose would be possible. Anyone wishing to do so could even buy a specimen for donation (tax deductible). Suggested materials would include Petoskey stones, of course (wouldn't a big polished Michigan look good in that display?), septaria, brachiopods, horn corals, Mich. copper, gypsum (all colors and types), epidote (massive and crystals), specular hematite, prehenite, L.Superior agates, garnets, jasper conglomerate, datolite and many others. Probably other-than-Michigan materials would also be welcome.

We don't need to have a huge amount of material, but do let's get a grouping that we will be proud and happy to send and to have displayed under the club name.
