

in judging will be established. Each member is invited to enter up
to three cabochons a month, as a "Beginner" (one who has finished
less than 10-12 Cabochons), or "Intermediate" (those who have done
more than a dozen cabs). Cabs should be unmounted, identified with
a piece of tape on the back on which is written your membership
card number only, and turned in for judging before the meeting starts.

Those who will receive lapidary award ribbons for their Feb. entries include: beginners Louis Murray, Marilyn Arnold, and Mike Potter; also old-hands Dr. Robert Smith, Henry Tchozeski, James De Zwaan Sr. and Gordon Williams, who entered to help get the competition going, but really didn't expect to walk off with the honors. HOW I BECAME A ROCKHOUND

I was asked how I became a rockhound. This all started when I was a young boy, perhaps 4 or 5 years old. Perhaps there is no one factor, but the doings of many things involved. One of the reasons was liking to be out doors, also not having very many things to do with it became mecessary to do things for ones own self.

Someone helped me make a sling shot-the simple one with leather pad with a hole in the center to nest a stone plus two strings, , a smooth round stone is the best. This started the search for the one stone apart from all others.

When I started school I met an Italian orphan boy who had been adopted by a warm hearted family. We became very close friends. This boy, from somewhere, had some knowledge of gem stones. Where he had gotten this knowledge I don't know--somewhere he must have been around someone who knew something about art of lapidary. He knew something about the stones, which would polish, so the search was on.

We were, perhaps, too young to get information of any kind, so all we did was gather stones, which our mothers threw out. We both became engrossed in the mystery of rocks, which leads to the study of minerals, which leads to where I sometimes wonder.

From my boyhood curiosity of what is in the stream bed, or under the hump of dirt, or over the next hill; then to what night be buried under sand, hid under the crust of the stone, the wonders of what this earth contains, the love to find something new. The perfect gem. The people we meet. The delight we see in the eyes of boys and girls when we can give them some rocks so they, too can know how to start a fine collection of rocks. Then, alos, the selfish part, to collect for ones ownself the finest specimens so as to do a little bragging and a little showing off—with the thought in mind to some day give them where they can be seen and used. This thought of doing something useful, which harms no living thing, is how I became a rockhound.

LAPIDARY HINTS: Sander Cleaner - Crepe rubber is an excellent "Cleaner" for lapidary sanding cloth. The crepe rubber used is the same as is used for shoe soles. A small thick sheet of crepe rubber is held against the sanding cloth while in motion. The crepe rubber acts as an eraser and will remove the accumulations of debris and expose the abrasive cloth for better and faster work.
