### BETTY CROCKER COUPONS

### "THE SCHOLARSHIP FUND"

We have been asked by many of our newer members, and a few of the older ones, too.. "Just what IS the Scholarship Fund? What is it's purpose? What does it do?" For the benefit of those of you "in the dark" here is a brief summary:

For many years, it was the dream of the AFMS to create a sum large enough to support yearly scholarships, for deserving Earth Science students working toward their Master's Degree, using only the interest from the fund. This particular level of education was chosen because the Directors of the Foundation felt that anyone who has progressed this far into the Earth Sciences is not likely to change his goal or drop out. ### (Scholarship fund continued)

It was determined that \$1.00 from each of the 50,000 rockhounds belonging to the Federations would do the trick, and a plea went out to all the clubs. Early in 1964 the AFMS Scholarship Foundation, Inc. was formed to handle these contributions. About this time, General Mills agreed to redeem all Betty Crocker coupons, regardless of expiration date, at  $\frac{1}{2}$  each, and we rockhounds began to get interested in the project, raising the fund from less than 3,000 to the present level of 44,000. 100% certificates were offered to clubs sending in coupons or cash equivalent of \$1.00 per club member. As of October 1967, 248 clubs had received their 100% certificates. Breaking this down by Federations, the Midwest Federation is leading with 84, Rocky Mountain is next with 46, followed by California with 42, Northwest 34, Eastern 23 and Texas 19. Many of these groups have gone on to 200, 300, 400 and 500%, the Southwest Kansas Gem and Mineral Society of Garden City is more than 1000% and the Miami Gemcrafters are over 1700%. Plaques are presented to clubs reaching the 500% level and again at the 1000% mark. Three Federations have attained their 100%, just that \$1.00 has been contributed for each member -- and they are Texas, Midwest and Rocky Mountain. Oklahoma has the distinction of being the first State to report that all clubs are 100%.

Each year an outstanding Earth Science personality is selected to receive the award. They in turn select the University or College of their choice and the actual recipient of the scholarship. Richard M. Pearl, Dr. Frederick Pough and Paul Desautels have been honored thus far, and twoyear scholarships for \$200, \$300 and \$400 have been awarded. Since the fund is nearing its goal, the Directors feel that they will be able to award two \$500 Scholarships in 1968.




