# MINERAL COLLECTING

I want to tell you what I know about mineral collecting because it is the phase of the earth science complexes which offers the most active participation for those of us who live in Michigan. Many times I have heard members of our club say "I'm only interested in the lapidary part of our hobby", or "I like field trips best, I like to find everything in my collection for myself", or "what can we look for around Grand Rapids".

A few obvious facts must now be considered. To the person whose sole interest in the rockhobby is in the lapidary field, people living in Michigan will have to buy their cutting material or trade for it. The only cutting material in good supply is Kona-dolomite at Negaunee, Jaspilite in the same area, Labradorite or peristerite at Wassau, Wisc., and Jasper or chert at Flint Ridge, Ohio. Beautiful small agates may be collected in the Lake Superior region and along the Mississippi River and that is it.

To the confirmed field tripper, we live in the middle of a great limestone bowl of many layers covered over with the debris of four great continental glaciers. Where the shovels of the gravel pit operators have scarred the earth's surface the varied materials of the drift are spread before us, a limitless sampling of the rocks and minerals that go into the making of our world, an inviting introduction to the study of geology. In some places man has cut and blasted deep into the limestone rock itself and page by page the book of geology is opened to the student, recording the history of life in the fossils of the preceeding ages and the minerals which have been deposited among these rock formations. Now, since this is to be the story of mineral collecting, I will leave the tale of fossil collecting to another to be told at another time.

Members of the Grand Rapids Mineral Society are, by geological circumstances and geographical necessity, mineral collectors and so let us consider the minerals. Most basic substances inthe earth, they form the building materials of the rocks and in their most pure, rare, and beautiful forms they are the gems which the lapidary fashions with such loving care. A mineral specimen is an object of study and enjoyment to you and should be selected to give you as much understanding and knowledge as possible. Collect as nice crystals as possible and as much variety of crystal as you can find in the locality. Study and identify the specimen and index it for your collection. A good way to do this is to paint a small square on the back or bottom of the specimen with white enamel and mark a number in the square with black india ink or enamel. The Dana System of classification is a good one to follow and has the advantage of almost universal acceptance, although, it is perfectly all right to develop and use your own system provided you arrive at this determination through study and not happenstance.

The important thing is to have a system of classification and to use it, Many of us have started our collections depending on memory for the identification and localities of our specimens, with confusion as a result. The beginner may avoid this pitfall by starting out his collection right in the beginning. This article is meant to be the first in a series and I am not going to attempt (cont. on next page)

to cover too much ground here. I would like to suggest that those of you who plan to collect at Clay Center on November 12th follow a few basic rules for good mineral collecting.

First of all, buy and use a good field guide, read it at home before the field trip. In the case of Clay Center, you will be collecting in a working limestone quarry in northwestern Ohio. This quarry is one of the classic locations for celestite and the associated minerals sometimes found here are calcite, sphalerite, chalcopyrite, and fluorite. Learn what these minerals look like and their mode of occurence. In order to enjoy your field trip completely wear a good pair of solid, comfortable shoes and field clothes; take a pair of safety glasses or goggles and a pair of work gloves if your hands are soft. Take along a cardboard box or two for your specimens and plenty of wrapping to protect the cyrstals. Some of us like to place the more delicate crystals in a box and fill the box with sawdust or ground up corn cobs, something that willprotect the specimens from rubbing against each other and from vibration and road bounce in transportation. For the sake of simplicity I will list my own equipment and let you be your own judge of what to take with you.

4 sturdy cardboard boxes and shredded paper and sawdust a rock pick - a 3 pound hammer - several chisels - a 5 foot steel bar with a chisel edge - a pickax - a few bandaids - a bottle of tincture merthiclate - a swapping box in case some rockhound I bump into has something I want real bad.

An so, good hunting, fellow rockhounds! Please let the Glacial Drifter know if you liked this article well enough to want more of the same, and what particular information you would like covered in this series. I am listing a short bibliography for those of you who want to do a little reading.
