MEDIEVAL DOCTORS WERE ROCKHOUNDS, TOO!

You may have just the ticket for curing everything from tired blood to a sour disposition. At least, that's what the Medieval M.D.'s taught, in writings that contained more magic than medicine, perhaps, but then -- shucks, who knows? For example, here are some of the gem materials and minerals that promised all sorts of wonderful things:

LAKE SUPERIOR AGATE "The Rainbow in Rock" by Theodore C. Vannasse

Do you like to pick Lake Superior Agate? Do you like to cut and polish these little gems? Do you want to understand their formation and occurence? If your reply is "yes" you will find the answers to many of your questions in Mr. Vanasse's little book, which accurately describes the many variations to be found in Lake Superiors. The text is excellently illustrated with many photographs of the author's own collection. Definite localities for collecting are not given, but anyone who has ever picked Lake Superior Agates will tell you that there are no agate beaches that haven't been thoroughly gleaned for many a year, and ledges with agates in situ are a carefully guarded secret to the few who know of their locations. To quote the book "On a Sunday afternoon a carload of rockhounds stops at my door and asks, where can we find some agates?" I direct them with my tongue in my cheek. If I knew where there was an agate, I myself would have been there yesterday or the day before to snatch it."
