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

Les Pearl has made arrangements for us to have a field trip to a strip coal mine in Indiana. We will be hunting fern fossils and other coal associated fossils. Bring your boots, it may be muddy.

Please make your reservations with Les Bearl and we will meet at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday morning, July 23rd at the spot called BIG ROAD on the map below. This is reached by going south on US 41 through Terre Haute. One mile beyond Terre Haute, on the left is a sign "YOUNGSTOWN", proceed exactly one mile farther on US 41 to a gravel road. Turn left and proceed for two miles until you cross the railroad track where you will come to a wide gravel road, called BIG ROAD on the map. Here, we will be met by Mr. & Mrs. Merton A. Young of the Wabash Valley Gem & Mineral Society who have kindly offered to be our guides for this trip.

Terre Haute is approximately 300 miles from Grand Rapids, so it is suggested that you plan on staying in the area just north of Terre Haute on Friday night and then proceed to Terre Haute for breakfast and on south to the meeting place. Les reports that there are a number of good motels along US 41 and there are two state parks, Shades State Park, and Turkey Run State Park, which have camping facilities for those who want to camp.

On Sunday, June 12th, The Kalamazoo Geological and Mineral Society presented this area with an excellent show and swap session. The four rockshops participating provided an adequate variety of equipment display and gem and mineral material for purchase. The city of Kalamazoo turned out enmass to support the show, and the only complaint we heard was "too crowded, we should have taken a larger room." We saw and spoke to Jim and Ruth Perkins, Art Elsenheimer, Mrs. Spores (with her son and daughter-in-law), Jean Ewing, Otto and Mrs. Weisner from the Grand Rapids Club.

The show was done in cases belonging to individual members of the Kalamazoo club, about thirty cases of the Wichita design that has been so generally accepted throughout the show circuit of all of the federations. A tip of the DRIFTER hat to the Kalamazoo club in general and to Clark Woolf and Spencer Van Vaikenburgh in particular for promoting the display case program. We hope that someone will do as good a job for the Grand Rapids Mineral Society. Incidentally, in the near future, the GLACIAL DRIFTER will carry an article on the Wichita case, complete with drawings and specifications.

In addition to the sales booths of four dealers, all of whom are members of the Kalamazoo Club, there were grab bags for the pebble pups and beginners made up of rocks and minerals donated by the club members. Then, there was a silent auction which produced some real values in cutting rough, excellent mineral specimens, and finished jewelry.

Tailgate swapping went on all day in the parking area and yours truly took a few minutes away from the booth to turn a Baghdad Chrysocolla specimen into the prettiest Pugh Quarry Calcite group you ever saw -- big, clean, double-terminated cyrstais --- collected about six years ago. There won 't be anything like that coming out of Pugh until about 1963 when we hope to have a club field trip to that quarry.

The local shows are your chance to see what the other fellow is doung and to collect a lot of new friends along with a few new rocks. And, of course, at the bigger regional shows, you get to see more, make more friends, and collect even more rocks. Hope Nina and I will see you at the next show held within a couple of hundred miles or so.
