



SEPTEMBER MEETING

For those of you who missed Tolson Radioff last month I will attempt to summarize what I felt were his most important comments on working with silver.

Design: Design and practicalty go hand in hand - the design must wear well besides being aesthetic. Have in your mind's eye what the finished product will look like - put it down on paper. Then take from or add to it as you goalong. If you get an idea get it down on paper before you lose it. Try to make the mounting correspond to the stone. The bezel is nothing but a frame - the less silver and the simpler the design the better.

Equipment: Mostly equipment found around the house. As you get better and more interested you can add the specialized items. For soldering a Prest-O-Light acetylene tank known as a "B" tank and hand torch. Mr. Radioff stressed the point that he feels this set up is more economical in the long run and much more efficient than the bottled gas or gas and air blow pipes. The mouth (air) operated blow pipe, although the least expensive and used by many successfully, is inadequate in his hands and in the hands of most beginners he feels. A few small files, soldering tweezers, black iron binding wire and a piece of sheet asbestos are necessary. He does not use charcoal or asbestos soldering blocks as they take too much heat away from the work slowing up the soldering. He likes curved plate shears for cutting metal in preference to a jeweler's saw whenever possible though the saw is a necessary piece of equipment and is very inexpensive.

Soldering: Sterling silver is 925 parts pure silver and 75 parts pure copper. It can be hardened by working (bending, pounding, etc.) or by heat treating. It can be softened by heating to 1100-1200°F (light cherry red) and air cooled or quenched in water. Heat above 1200°F tends to cause grain growth with roughening and possible cracking. The solder used is easy-flo 1450° flat strip solder. He does not advocate for general use more than one heat or step soldering. This facilitates repair if necessary and the necessity for care in not mixing up the solder. Also the color is uniform and with proper play of heat only solder is necessary. Heat the metal to be soldered, not the solder. Solder flows toward the highest heat. You MUST have good, close joints to flow silver solder. Solder will not fill a void. Joints must be CLEAN. Sparex #2 for pickling (removing exidation or cleaning) is safe with no corrosive, obnoxious or poinsonous fumes.

Flux: "Battern's" Self Pickling Flux makes it possible to solder many times without cleaning, does not expand and move or heave the material like many borax base types do.

Technique: Form well adapted joints.

Pickle: Clean well.

Hold the binding wire or soldering tweezers. Heat evenly but do not overheat. Bring the work to the torch, if possible; rather than bringing the torch to the work. Touch the solder to the joint. (continued on next page)

He does not advocate placing the solder on the joint then heating it until it flows. He feels that the tendency is to heat the solder rather than the silver causing balling of the solder with the necessity for more heat and possible burning.

Clean by pickling and remove excess solder with a file. Polish on a flannel wheel rather than muslin as it has less tendency to catch and throw the finished product. Use Bendick or tripoli rouge is too dirty - finish on buff with nothing to give high shine.

Oxidizing - darkening with liver of sulphur. Thumbnail size pieces dissolved in a pint of warm water. Soak entire piece in the solution, the longer the darker. Then polish with Bon Ami tripoli, etc., to the desired brilliance the parts not wished to be dark.

Anti- flux: Yellow ochre.

These are some of Mr. Radloff's ideas and techniques. He does not say that these are the only methods but that they work well in his hands and he feels that they can be used by you with success.

There are certainly other ideas and techniques available for you to chose from. He only hopes that he has helped you a little with his presentation. For this we sincerely thank Mr. Radloff.

SILVER CLASSES (beuniand) actal blaid

Some of the local rock shops will be starting silver classes soon. One already has. These will probably be held to relatively small classes with considerable individual instruction and without a doubt will be well worth while to those interested in this phase of our hobby. Your club also has the opportunity of offering a course in silver work. Tolson Radloff, last month's speaker, has agreed to conduct classes on either Monday or Friday nights to any interested. A summary of his program along with some of his beliefs about jewelry design and thoughts on silver work can be found in the discussion of last month's program.

His fee to the club will be \$30.00 per night. We will also have to furnish a place to hold the classes. Obviously the larger the group, the less the cost per individual. At this time we have the names of 5 persons who are interested. If we would meet at someones home with this number the cost would be 6.00 per night which probably would be prohibitive to many. If you are interested in joining this group please contact either your president or Charles Moore. You will not be obligated in any way at this time.

After we find out the number interested we will work out a fee and at that time set up our class schedule if you are willing. The fee for this type of class will have to be collected in advance as we cannot expect the club to underwrite something for only a few members. Also the student will be expected to furnish his own silver and supplies and at least some of the small tools. The soldering torch will be furnished by Mr. Radloff. The number of classes would run from a minimum of five to be of any value at all, to preferably ten, and more if enough are interested. Silver and tools are available in at least one of the local rock shops, or you can order from catalogues from the many out of town establishments. The club, of course, would like to have you keep the advertisers in the DRIFTER in mind. We are sure they will do their best to help you on special orders if you wish.
