

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
The Grand Rapids Mineral Society is a Non-Profit Corporation affiliated with the Midwest Federation and the American Federation of Mineral Societies.

The Michigan Basin Geological Society's annual field trip will start Friday morning, May 19th at 8:30 a.m. at the White Pine Copper mine in northwestern Ontonagon County. Reservations for lodging on Thursday evening will be handled by the White Pine Inn.

Friday morning will be spent underground examining cores and exposed sections in the mine. The mine has a very limited number of hard hats and safety glasses for visitors. Since it is absolutely necessary to wear them underground, all field trip participants should bring a hard hat and safety glasses. Those who do not bring their own may be out of luck on the underground tour. The trip underground will be dry but dusty underfoot. Field boots are in order. Flashlights will be useful in some areas.

The group will have lunch at the White Pine Inn. Friday afternoon, outcrops in the Silver City area and Porcupine Mountains will be visited, where the group will be Copper Harbor Conglomerate, Nonsuch Shale and Freda Sandstone. There will be an extra assessment for the entry fee to Porcupine Mountain State Park if the car does not have a State Park sticker.

Friday night will be spent in Houghton, where advance reservations will be made. Saturday, the party will visit south Range Quarry, where they will see Keweenawan lava flows; Baltic Copper Mine, where there is good mineral collecting associated with the Keweenawan lava flows; the Limestone Mountain which is an outlier composed of Cambrian in the basal part and Trenton in the upper part. The group will have a box lunch at Limestone Mountain.

After lunch, participants will proceed to L'Anse where they will see exposures of Huronian and Cambrian including Sinclines and Anticlines, Unconformities, and one of the few east-west running dikes seen so far north.

Saturday night, the party will return to Houghton for a banquet after which Dr. Ernest Ohle, chief geologist for White Pine Mine will address the group.


Sunday the group will travel northward to Eagle Harbor, observing the stratigraphy of the Keweenawan lava flows and sediments. The group will have an opportunity to study structure and sedimentation and a chance to collect minerals in some of the old abandoned copper mines along the way.

This promises to be an excellent field trip offering an opportunity to observe: oil in Nonesuch Shale (Pre-Cambrian Hydrocarbon) around the White Pine Mine, which has been of great interest to petroleum geologists; Algal structure in the Keweenawan; Interior exposure of formations - down in the mine; can observe structure, physical distortion, faults, etc.; sedimentary features in mine and outcrop; physiography of the Keweenaw Peninsula and Porcupine Mountain area.

All of this you are invited to see and hear through the magic of the camera and modern electronics on Wednesday evening, December 13th, at Riverside Elementary School, starting at 8:00 p.m. No hard hats, or heavy boots will be needed while you take this spring field trip in December in the warmth and comfort of the school while the winter winds whip the snow around the buildings outside. (Editor's note - at time of going to press it was a balmy day, no snow). Our own President, Dr. Rose, will be our guide (speaker) on this trip. See you all there.

Henry Tchozeski and his son, Steve, will be at the Rock Sale table with some of the surplus from the Auction. Gus Beuker will have something to please a lucky winner in the door prize drawing and the donation drawing.

Installation of officers and board members for 1962 will also take place at this meeting.


NOVEMBER MEETING IN REVIEW

Today's mail brought a letter from my wandering parents who left Michigan to get away from the coming snows. They have towed their trailer through the blizzards in Oklahoma, Texas, and northern New Mexico. I hate to tell them about our Michigan Fall this year. My parents are not rock-hounds, they say! Can't be bothered looking around on the ground for rocks when there is all of that wonderful scenery to !cok at. Perhaps you would be interested in a portion of the letter:

"We got back to Albuquerque around 5:30 - sent a night letter and went to The Rock and Mineral Shop operated by a wonderful young fellow, James Winchel!. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and treated us most royally. We showed him the petoskey stone, (I furnished them with some local trading material) and the Ishpeming ones (Konna dolomite) and did a little plain and fancy trading. He is sending you some petrified wood suitable for polishing from Cuba, New Mexico; a handful of apache tears from Jemez, New Mexico,; and two salbnite roses from the Laguna Indian Reservation in New Mexico. These are also called chalcedony roses, I believe. (That is what is fun about this -- your guess is as good as mine as to what they will be. Salbnite could be selenite, but this is gypsum and not chalcedony and of course there are chalcedony roses too.) He sent a little piece of Smithsonite. This is very rare. Comes from the Kelley mine in New Mexico. It is named after James Smithson as is the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C. To top it off we bought you some genuine turquoise. This is very costly but he was very reasonable with us. Then he said: "I believe the rock club is meeting tonight at the University of New Mexico in the Geology Building. A little later these two non-believers asked me to sign them up as members to our club and for any information that I might have on rock hunting in southern New Mexico and Arizona. I thought you might be interested in what a couple of non-rock-hounds had to say about our hobby.
