


And a real humdinger of a program will be presented by Miss Lary Jane Dockeray. Don't know the subject - but do know that it will be outstanding.

#### ROCK MUSEUM VISITED

One of the highlights of our trip west was a stop at a display of local rocks, minerals, fossils, and artifacts in Greybull, Wyoming.

This is a display of materials owned by members of the Rockologist Club of that city and shown by them during the tourist season each year. We understand that the space, in a downtown store, is donated by one of the members. The other expenses involved are paid for by donations from visitors and the sale of some of the materials donated by the club members. A member is on hand to greet visitors, a different one donating time each day and evening that the display is open.

We talked to two of the members and learned that they are trying to find a place in their town where they can make this display a permanent thing. They also told us that last year there were 17,000 visitors from nearly every state and from some foreign countries. They felt that by the end of the season this year the visitors would number at least 25,000.

We were given a c lub card which proclaims that "Our members never die, they just slowly petrify". The first thing one sees as he walks in the door is an Ammonite - Parapuzosia Bradyi - one of the greatest ammonites ever recovered in North America. This is an extinct cuttlefish that lived in the ancient Cretaceous Seas that covered Wyoming 100 million years ago. It presently measures nearly 5 feet and weighs 960 pounds. In life it would measure much more, perhaps 7 or 8 feet. A large portion of the original shell was lost through weathering.

The members of this club are to be congratulated on a fine proj ct, well carried out. More clubs should give this type of project consideration. I know the traveling rock hobbyists would really appreciate seeing displays of this nature in the areas they visit.
