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1966 FIELD TRIP CONVENTION

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Recognize many of them? These are some of the 60 odd rocks and minerals that have been identified in Michigan's Copper Country said by some to contain more minerals per square foot than any spot on the earth. Whether you attend the Field Trip Convention on June 16-17-18-19 as a graduate geologist or as a plain everyday rockhound as the writer is, chances are that you will come up with a number of the above minerals on some of the scheduled trips. If lady luck isn't with you, the swap session and silent auction planned should enable you to add some of these to your collection.

I won't attempt to elaborate on all the above minerals in this issue but will try to highlight three that I am told are found only in Michigan's Keeweenaw Peninsula.

Chlorastrolite or greenstones as they are commonly known, exist in abundance on Isle Royale located forty miles out in Lake Superior. Some are found on the local beaches and some of the poor rock piles yield a few each year. These dark green gemstones ranging from peasize to the size of a quarter are characterized by the turtleback design. A cab the size of a dime will bring about 550.00 Many greenstones have specks of thomsonite in them to highlight their beauty.

Mohawkite is found under ground in the Calumet and Hecla Mine at Mohawk, seven miles north of Calumet. This heavy mineral comes out of the mines silvery in color but turns into many colors of the rainbow when heated or exposed to the air.

Patricianite is a copper specked vein material found on many of the rock piles. It ranges from green to grey and pink in color, is easy to work and takes a good polish. The story goes that Patrician ite is named after Patrica, the daughter of the owner of an agate shop at Copper Harbor. Some of the beaches also yield patricianite in water worn pieces.

Getting back to the convention program we have been fortunate in getting John Sinkankas of San Diego, as the principal speaker for the Saturday evening festivities at Ladsworth Hall. 1-r. Sinkankas I well known as the author of a number of books on gems and minerals and as one of the foremost authorities on gemology. He has indicated that he will spend the four convention days with us.
